


GERALDINE (JERRI) O'DELL

Way to go Jerri! We are proud to has you as District 1's All Star!!!




JAMES MANNING & DIANNE MANNING

"I have had the honor, the last 9 years, to be actively involved in the Masters Games by serving on the District Masters Games & State Masters board.

Over the course of time, the games have allowed me to formulate friendships I will always carry close and dear to my heart. One of those friendships was with a very sweet and competitive soul named Harry Chandler.

I will never forget the very first time I met the spry 80-year-old grandfather. He was holding a ping pong paddle and challenged me to a game. '

'Let's see what you got', he grinned. Of course, I wasn't a pro like him, but we definitely had a good time competing against each other.

And gradually, Harry and I formed a wonderful friendship. I had the honor of spending a week with him and his lovely wife each year at the State Masters Games. Through the years, I came to really respect and admire Harry for his willingness to never give up and do his very best at every game he participated in.

It was such an honor several years ago to nominate him for a State All Star Award and watch him receive his award, with friends and family present. I will never forget the admiration I felt for him after he suffered a stroke months before the district games, but still fought his way back to the strength he needed to compete at the District & State Master Games.

He never slowed down and he never stopped doing what he could to help other people. So, when I heard that Harry Chandler died on April 28th, I definitely shed a lot of tears. I was on bed-rest and only a few days away from unexpectedly having my twin boys early, so I wasn't able to be at the funeral. However, I thought a lot about him.

[Harry] was born on December 27, 1930 to Edward F. and Josephine (Campbell) Chandler in Malden, Missouri. He graduated from Hanceville High School in 1950 and then moved to Michigan. He served two years in the U.S. Army and was in the Korean War. He began working for Buick Engineering where he was a Test Build Analyst and retired after 42 years.

He headed the bus ministry at Corunna Road Baptist Church in Flint and never failed to give his testimony to everyone he saw. He served as a Deacon for 58 years and a greeter, most recently at Seventh Street Baptist Church, where he made an impact on the lives of each and every one who came through the church doors.

He was an avid softball player throughout the years, holding the record at Flint Whaley Park for the fastest windmill pitch. He coached girls' softball at Faith Missionary Church and was pitching coach for the Carman-Ainsworth High School girls softball team in Flint. His true sports passion was his love for table tennis. He played on his lunch break everyday throughout his career at General Motors.

He loved to exercise and was a member of the Wallace State Wellness Club where he played table tennis and volleyball 3 days a week for 20 years. While at Wallace, he participated in the Senior Olympics and Masters Games through the Cullman County Commission on Aging, as well where he played table tennis and horseshoes, winning a total of 18 gold medals in District, State and Regional competitions.

Even though, he won't be here to compete with us in June at the District Masters Games, his spirit will definitely be felt as seniors compete at the District Masters Games."
